but the state of the world has got considerably more frightening. As we write this message in mid-April, we are thinking of all those people who are suffering in Ukraine and have lost loved ones. Our thoughts and prayers are with them all.

It is even more unbelievable that in late January, we were honoured to attend a ceremony to plant an oak tree at King George V playing fields, to commemorate the Association of Jewish Refugees' project to plant 80 trees to mark 80 years since the organisation helped so many people come to Britain after the Second World War. Who would have thought that we would be seeing war in Europe again now, as we stood with community members and faith leaders to remember all those lost during the Holocaust.

Turning now to local news, the Winter Fair was a great success. Given that it was the first time that Aldenham Parish Council was able to host a big event, the turn-out was excellent, and it was lovely to see all different age groups enjoying themselves. The festive lights looked splendid in Radlett and gave everyone a warm feeling when passing through the Village.

A considerable amount of Council's time has been spent on giving feed-back to Hertsmere Borough Council on its draft Local Plan. We are pleased that through the hard work of so many people responding to the consultation, Hertsmere has decided to shelve its draft Local Plan for the time being. The parish council has asked Hertsmere to provide a list of brownfield sites available within the parish, in the hope that these sites would be the first option for any new development.

The parish council continues to support the 'Save Aldenham Reservoir' campaign and we are delighted with the success to retain the public footpaths for everyone's benefit. The Access for All working party has been busy trying to improve life in Radlett for all those with particular needs. This working party has attracted members from across the political spectrum as we work to make Radlett more inclusive. Some of the working group's ideas have already been adopted, such as providing designated parking for Blue Badge Holders at parish events, and quiet areas at events for those who need some time out.

As you are all aware, Her Majesty the Queen will celebrate 70 years on the throne in June and the Queen's Jubilee working party has been arranging some very special celebrations. In conjunction with Inspire All, and with the very generous funding from a local law firm Debenhams Ottaway Solicitors, who are our principal sponsor, our Hertsmere Borough Councillors, John Apthorp, Beaver Travel and Brass Monkey, the Bank Holiday weekend should be a fantastic experience for those attending. On Thursday 2 June, there will be a Beacon Lighting event and on Sunday 5 June the big Jubilee Lunch will take place in Newberries Parade with lots of entertainment for all. Please see inside the pages of this magazine for further details, including how to book your table for the Jubilee Lunch.

APC continues to pay Hertsmere to keep the first hour free for those parking in Newberries Car Park. We hope this continued initiative will help our local shopkeepers, after having to be closed for so many months during the pandemic, by encouraging people to shop locally.

APC is happy to continue to support the Citizens Advice who are available on a drop-in basis in the Radlett Centre every Tuesday from 10:00am to 1:00pm.

Community Infrastructure Levy Grants

The Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) is a charge that local authorities can set on new developments in order to raise funds to upgrade the infrastructure and

facilities. CIL is payable when certain types of new building projects are undertaken. As part of this levy, Aldenham Parish Council (APC) automatically receives 15% of any CIL levied on developments within the parish. Due to the recently adopted Radlett Neighbourhood Plan, APC now receives a further 10% of CIL collected from developments within the Radlett Neighbourhood Plan area only , which can then be spent on capital projects within the whole parish.

In June 2020, APC announced the CIL capital grants scheme for local voluntary organisations and community groups. The scheme is to help fund capital projects within the parish. APC has set aside funding from the CIL to invest in the local community with grants of between $\pounds1,000$ to $\pounds20,000$ available to applicants for capital spending. Core organisational costs such as salaries, rent or utilities are not eligible.

So far, grants totalling £22,992.26 have been awarded to 4 local organisations: Radlett Bowls Club -- towards repairs to the surrounds at the ground and a new pump for the sprinkler system; 1st Radlett Scouts -- for new front entrance to the Scout Hut; Aldenham War Memorial Hall -- towards the creation of a Centenary Garden at the Hall; and Radlett Men's Club - for a replacement beer chiller. APC is pleased to confirm that all the CIL grants projects for the community benefit have been completed.

The following statements have been received from supported organisations:

1st Radlett Scouts - APC supports new disabled access ramp for Scout Hut

'The new entrance replaced a set of uneven and crumbling steps that were outdated and becoming dangerous. Gordon Dootson, 1st Radlett Chair said "We are delighted with the new entrance which completes the refurbishment of Kent Lodge over the past 3 years...APC have also helped with the cost of resurfacing the path to the hut which was becoming dangerous. We are thankful to both APC and Hertsmere Council for their support. We now have a community asset that is of a really high quality."

Kent Lodge sees the 50th anniversary of its opening this year and the refurbishment is a fitting way to celebrate by bringing the facilities up to date.'

⁶ On 12 October 2020, Aldenham Parish Council approved a grant to transform the disused and unsightly space surrounding the iconic Aldenham War Memorial Hall in Letchmore Heath into a Centennial Garden to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the Hall and the brave men and women who have fought for our country and to provide ongoing social and educational benefits to the residents of Aldenham Parish.

The Centennial Garden was successfully completed by local builders and Parish volunteers of all ages who rallied to re-lay paving blocks, to build planters and seating areas, to dig, to weed, to spread compost and donated wood chips and to plant a wide variety of flowers for the 2021 summer growing season. The work prioritised re-use of as many existing materials as possible to make the project as environmentally friendly as possible.

The Centennial Garden is a gathering place for gardeners young and old, able and disabled who will, this growing season, be planting vegetables alongside their flowers to donate to a local food bank. The Garden also adds value to Hall users who use it as an outside space for events and provides an amazing space for the Aldenham War Memorial Hall Pop Up Café which sells donated baked cakes, biscuits, jams, tea and coffee to walkers, dog walkers, bikers and locals to pay for gardening tools and seeds.

Many thanks to Aldenham Parish Council for their support for this incredible project. It is a fitting tribute to the original Trustees who mandated that the Hall should be used for 'the social benefit of the inhabitants and their visitors and friends without distinction of religion, creed, political opinions, social rank, sex or age.'

KING GEORGE V PLAYING FIELDS LANDSCAPE MANAGEMENT PLAN

In 1938, Lucy Phillimore gave Aldenham Parish Council (APC) a parcel of land adjacent to Cobden Hill, which surrounds the Radlett Cricket Club First XI pitch. In order to protect and maintain



the donated land as open fields for recreational use, APC transferred the land to a newly formed body, the King George V Playing Fields Trust, now part of Fields in Trust. In 2019, APC set up a separate trust to manage the area called King George's Field Radlett Trust, (KGF) with APC as the sole corporate trustee.

These fields are known as the Rose Field, Tabards Field (leased to Tabard Rugby Football Club) second pitch (leased to Radlett Cricket Club), the Picnic Field and Salters Field. There are also two deep holes, caused by gravel extraction to build the railway/ main road known as Wellhouse Dell and Cobden Hill Dell.

In 2021, as part of the ongoing open spaces strategy, the KGF commissioned Maydencroft to produce a ten-year landscape management plan for Salters Field, the Picnic Field and Wellhouse Dell. The Rose Field was excluded from the management plan, as KGF is considering installing recreational play facilities on that field.

The management plan was signed off by the Trust in January 2022 and a copy is available from the Council offices. The concept behind the plan is to provide increased diversity for wildlife and trees. Over the past few years, trees have been planted in the fields, but these will now be grouped and include native species to the area, as well as appropriate to the soil and drainage of the fields.

In Salters Field, there are now mown paths across the field, which will allow other grasses to grow and hopefully will allow wild flowers, local insects and vertebrae to flourish.

In early 2022, an oak was planted at the top of Salters Field, as well as two replacement lime trees in the avenue of limes that face Watling Street from Salters Field. In the Picnic Field, one hundred and five whips of hazel, crab apple, goat willow, downy birch and hawthorn have been planted by the Radlett Youth Council and local schools.

The old rifle range in Wellhouse Dell has been dismantled, as it was not being used and had become dilapidated and dangerous.

Over the next few months, a programme of works will be drawn up to put the management plan into effect. Please do let us know your thoughts about the changes you see.


FILMING THE CORONATION

My daughter-in-law, Councillor Estelle Samuelson, asked me if I could remember my scary experience as a cameraman at the Queen's Coronation.

On 2nd June 1953, sixteen months after Princess Elizabeth became Queen Elizabeth II, following the death of her father King George VI, I was working for Fox Movietone News on Ioan from my documentary company employer Rayant Pictures. Movietone News was, I think, the only newsreel company who were filming the whole Coronation in colour. I was allocated to be inside Westminster Abbey to get key shots – including the actual placing of the Crown on the head of our new Queen.

I was in a specially built sound proofed booth, created to match the look of the South Transept area of the ancient building. My location was just a few feet from the famous King Edward's chair - with the Stone of Scone beneath it. The Archbishop of Canterbury would be holding the Crown and at the crucial moment would lower it onto Queen Elizabeth's head. Of course, it was precisely the key moment of the entire ceremony. As the Archbishop prepared to lift the Saint Edward's Crown, I checked for the umpteenth time that both of the springs in my British made, clockwork driven, Newman-Sinclair 35mm camera were fully wound. When I grabbed the second spring winder-handle it made a loud and horrible zizzing noise. This told me that the spring inside the camera had failed at the decisive moment. During all my years as a cameraman, up until then and thereafter, not once had either of the two camera springs failed.

Two lucky happenings saved me from disgrace and maybe an early end to my career as a reliable cinematographer. At the final rehearsal in the Abbey the previous day, during a break, I had overheard another cameraman working for Movietone News – Paul Wyand – standing close to the Archbishop say "Sir, from my special camera position up in the roof of this glorious building, when you hold the Crown above our new Queen's head could you, would you, be kind enough to hold onto it for a few extra seconds, just for me please? This is so that I can change to a telephoto lens and get a great close-up of the magic moment for the people of the world to see". Happily for me the Archbishop obliged.



The legendary NEWMAN-SINCLAIR CAMERA made and provided documentary service almost from the beginning of cinema .

My second piece of luck was that I had a spare camera body ready to use if I had mechanical trouble of any kind. With the blessing of the Archbishop's donated extra seconds, holding the Crown in mid-air, I had just enough time to change the camera body, its lens and its magazine holding my only roll of the rare 35mm Gevaert colour negative film. All was well. My special shot still turns up regularly on television to this day.

My scary story has now reached, as they say in cinema parlance, The End.

Recalled some 70 years later by Sir Sydney Samuelson, 96, who is now (he says) more or less retired.

In 1980, Gary, after having had a couple of other jobs came for an interview for a job on the Groundstaff team for APC. I thought I would only be there for the summer and then move elsewhere, he said. He was interviewed for the job by Peter Bowen, the first of five Clerks he worked under, and started in May 1980. His first wage was £56 per week (I don't get much more now, he said with a smile).

Having just come for a summer job, the Clerk at the time encouraged Gary to go to college (paid for by APC) to study for a horticultural qualification. This was followed by one year obtaining a management diploma. Later, under P Truppin, Gary was made 'Asst Head of Groundstaff'. He felt this was an honorary title as there was no pay increase and eventually this title disappeared.

In the last few years, Gary had some health problems, which the council supported him through, and he was very grateful for this. He gradually reduced his working hours to fifteen hours per week, and he said he enjoyed coming to work for the comradery in the team, and the support they now got from the council.

His memory shall live forever.

Queen Elizabeth's Jubilee Celebrations in Radlett

On Sunday 5 June, Radlett, along with the rest of the country, will celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee with a street party along the High Street slip road. In common with her 2012 Diamond Jubilee celebrations, 150 tables for 8-10 people will be set out along Newberries Parade, along with food outlets, a barbecue and entertainment. Across the country, Jubilee

Beacons will be lit at the synchronised time of 9.45 pm on Thursday 2 June. Radlett's beacon will be located at the cricket ground. It's interesting to compare this coming 2022 Jubilee celebration programme with what was done in Radlett in 1953 when celebrating Queen Elizabeth II's Coronation.

In 1953, for the Coronation celebration, well over a year after the Queen's accession to the throne, Aldenham and Letchmore Heath initially planned separate events which Radlett "could join in if it liked". It was then proposed that Aldenham Parish Council should organise events for the whole of the Parish, and even though the "Coronation Fund" became overdrawn, a percentage of the local rates came to the rescue. Not begrudged I'm sure!

The whole week of celebrations started with a united church service for 700 people on the Phillimore Rec. Sporting events included a cricket match where the gentlemen were required to wear top hats. How many had to be hired, I wonder? There was a parade of decorated floats making its way up to Phillimore Rec behind a brass band. The photo shows an unusual French Peugeot 202, with headlights behind the front grill and a boot that can be reached only from inside. The photographer in the foreground is showing more interest in the car than the parade!

For children, there was a fancy dress competition, and they all received a souvenir mug and also an old and new sixpence to mark the change of monarch featured on the coin. There was a free 'old peoples' outing to London by coach that was available to anyone over 60. Maybe the perception of the over 60s as being 'old people' has changed in the last 69 years?

As in previous Royal Celebrations, Saturday, 6 June 1953 concluded with dancing, a bonfire and a fireworks display.



Looking back to 1935, for King George Vth's Diamond Jubilee, in addition to a sporting competition, the main entertainment consisted of a highway robbery re-enactment. The horse drawn stage coach, was trundled at speed around Phillimore Rec for the climax where it was robbed by Dick Turpin's gang who rushed out of Fir Spring Wood. Luckily the Bow Street Runners were on hand!

In 1937, for King George VI's Coronation, the parade again included decorated vehicles and was led

by the Radlett Brass Band. Sports events were prominent, including children's and adults' races, a tug of war, and public boxing competitions for local boys. I can't imagine that happening now! Maybe the

ubiquitous ladies' egg and spoon race, held in 1935 and 1937, has also had its day? For the first time the expertise of local 'Radlett Radio' allowed the King's Speech to be relayed to the crowd. King George VI's stammer was well under control by then.

Radlett & District Museum RADLETT HIGH STREET from our Archives... THE FIRST SHOPS

The first shop in Radlett was opened on Watling Street in 1884, now the site of Barclays Bank. It was the Radlett Stores, and included a post office and a men's club. Established by Charles Part of Aldenham Lodge, a strong advocate of co-operatives, the shop was run by the committee of the Radlett Industrial Society Ltd.

In the colourised picture below in 1887, the shop is decorated for Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee.



The Radlett Stores, opened 1884 BAKERY

In 1896, Henry Cole of High Cross transferred his Round Bush bakery to a newly built shop on Watling Street, where local customers could buy their bread freshly baked. Next door was William Andrew, The Smithy. On the wall



above the former bakery, now Lumley's, a stone is inscribed: 'WA•HC 1896'.

Cole's was joined in 1902 by new neighbours, Radlett Stores Limited, which

moved into larger premises from their original site shown in the picture above.

Gradually, family run businesses were opened with their owners living above the shops.

SHOPS ON 'THE TERRACE'

Cottages on the Terrace in Watling Street, to the south of the Railway Inn, were also converted into shops– their front gardens being levelled and tarmacked. Their forecourts are still private land today.

The shops traded in a variety of goods: **Newsagent & confectioner**- Albert Heaver **Saddlers**- William Wilson **Bootmake**r-William Rufus Allen **Butcher** Rodney Stephens [with whole mea

Tearooms-William

Picton **Fishmonger**- Fred Lamb; at the northern end where there was the most shade.

By 1912, two **Greengrocers' shops** had opened, and by the start of WW1 in 1914, there were some 47 traders.

And this is all before the development of the Oakway, in 1924, and Newberries Parade, finally completed in the 1960s.

Association of Jewish Refugees - 80 trees for 80 years

On a cold but dry Monday morning in January, some 50 guests gathered at Salters Field to attend the planting of an oak sapling to mark the 80th anniversary of the Association of Jewish Refugees. Radlett was delighted to be chosen as one of 80 locations around the UK to host this living memorial to the association's members.

The sapling was planted in Salters Field where it will be joined by more than 130 new saplings which are to be planted as part of the Queen's Green Canopy in honour of the Platinum Jubilee. So in years to come, this area will be a haven for birds and wildlife and hopefully a place for recreation and reflection.

The tree planting was attended by the Lord Lieutenant of Hertfordshire, Robert Voss, who spoke of his involvement with the project, the Mayor of Hertsmere, Councillor Anne



Swerling, and faith and community leaders. The tree was sponsored by local resident Dr Peter Brent, who attended along with his family and friends and gave a short address. The event was followed by refreshments in the Radlett Cricket Club.

The Three Horseshoes, Letchmore Heath



After extensive restoration and extension, The Three Horseshoes has reopened after having been closed for nearly two years. The works have modernised the building and its services, whilst also revealing some of the historic fabric and converting what is believed to have been originally a 16th century hay barn into a private dining room. The latest works form another chapter in the changes to this historic venue.

The earliest section of The Three Horseshoes is thought to have been built c.1586 as a three bay open hearth hall house with an adjoining smithy. The house likely included space for livestock and is an example of a rural English vernacular building. The 16th century section of the pub building is single storey and the steep pitch of the roof suggests it may originally have been thatched. During the

early 19th century the south end of the building was replaced with a double gabled two storey structure.

The refurbishment and extension of The Three Horseshoes has given the property a new lease of life and the opportunity to ensure its future viability as a hospitality venue. The latest changes reflect the changing demands to create a better dining

Spring has Sprung-Gardening Tips from Radlett Horticultural Society

Spring is here and for those of us with gardens it is time for a few jobs. That lawn that is looking a bit unkempt needs raking with a scratch rake. This will do it a power

of good, even if you are going to let it run a bit wild later in the season. Raking lets in the air and light and gets rid of moss and thatch and best of all, it is great aerobic exercise, a sort of free outdoor gym!

If you are looking for a nice tidy mown lawn then come up to the Radlett Horticultural Society store in Scrubbitts Park Road, Radlett between 10 am and 12 noon on the first and third Sunday of every month and buy some 'weed and feed'. If you are not a member no problem, you can join there for a mere $\pounds 2$ per year. We also sell bird food at very competitive prices. And here is a great tip. If you have never grown any of your own vegetables why not try climbing French beans.

They can be grown in tubs or a bed in the smallest of spaces and even the straggliest of plants seem to produce a bumper crop. You can either grow from seed or buy small plants from the garden centre and round the base you could try a few radishes for good measure.



And last but not least, don't be tempted to buy your annual flowers too early. Frost can play havoc with these and even if it doesn't kill them it knocks them back. Wait until mid May before planting out.

The current Radlett Safer Neighbourhood Team has been together now for the last two years, providing some continuity. We continue to learn about the locations and people within the community we serve, building confidence and reassurance along the way.



You said, we did - problem motorcyclists in Radlett

We have been working with partner agencies to tackle motorcyclists riding their off-road bikes illegally on open land.

Sergeant lain Brunt said: 'You told us that motorcyclists were driving illegally and in an anti-social manner near or on North Medburn Farm, in the Oakridge Lane area of Radlett and on land off Theobald Street in Borehamwood. As a result of your feedback we made this one of our priorities to tackle over a three-month period from November last year. We worked with Hertfordshire County Council to arrange for access points to be reviewed so that preventative measures could be put in place. As a result, new fencing and 'motorcycle inhibitors' have been installed at entrance points to public footpaths off Theobald Street to stop motorcyclists from gaining access to the land. Thanks to the support of Hertsmere Borough Council warning signage will also be going up shortly.

'While this work has been taking place behind the scenes, we have been carrying out a number of patrols with the constabulary's Rural Operational Support Team (ROST) to stop motorcyclists and take action. As part of this Section 59 warnings were issued to riders, which means if they are found riding illegally again their bikes can be seized. Community Protection Warning Notices have also been used as an effective deterrent and while doing this we have also spoken to the motorcyclists to stress what they are doing is illegal and the consequences of their behaviour.'

Free hour for shopping continues at Newberries Car Park

For many years, Aldenham Parish Council (APC) has been subsidising the parking fee for the first hour at Newberries car park to encourage its use by residents for their local shopping trips and to support local businesses. The fee for the second hour is £2.

Hertsmere Borough Council (HBC), who owns the car park, recently informed APC that as there had been no review of this subsidy for many years, it proposed to increase the amount APC paid for this subsidy to more than £20,000. Such an increase would have had a significant effect on the APC budget for 2022/23.

After negotiation, APC and HBC have agreed to a much smaller increase in the cost of this subsidy to $\pounds 10,000$. APC previously paid $\pounds 8,511$.

APC councillors hope residents agree that maintaining this free hour of parking is a sensible use of their council tax. In 2022/23, the precept for a Band D property will be £124.29 per year, an increase of 2.17%.
